There will be a series of three tests, and no final exam. Part of Test #3 will be take home. Take home question: "Define Myth and support your definition from Greek/Roman/other mythologies." 2 pages.

The reading assignments are due on the dates stated above. Class discussion of the assigned reading material will usually be a day or two after the reading assignment is due. **Make sure that you have the reading material ready on the due date, since there will be occasional quizzes.** Also, I have attempted to space out the reading material. Some of the reading assignments might be discussed in a single class, others spread out over many classes. **Daily quizzes will be given, beginning Aug. 26.** Grades-each test counts 28 points, quizzes, attendance and class participation 6 points; short paper 10 points. A 90-100; B 80-89; C 70-79; D 60-69; F 59 or below. There is no curve.
